Scripture Insights

In our Sunday readings from Lukeøs Gospel account, Jesus has been preaching in Galilee. Now he turns his attention to Jerusalem. õWhen the days for Jesus being taken up will be fulfilled, je resolutely determined to journey to Jerusalemö His decision will result in his death, yet he embraces this outcome.

Difficult challenges also face Jesusø potential followers. Three would-be followers ask to join Jesus. Before setting out, each has a request. One would like to return home to bury a father and another to bid farewell to family. Nothing could be more human than these requests, but Jesus rejects them. This shocks us until we realize that Jesus is exaggerating to get across his point. Jesus never opposes upholding family ties. After all, õHonor your father and motherö is one of the Ten Commandments. Jesus had also criticized the Pharisees for their refusal to support their elderly parents by õdedicating their money to Godö (Matthew 14:4-5)

cannot take precedence over onegs being with God.

The same was true in Old Testament times. The people of Israel constantly turned away from following God wholeheartedly by worshipping other gods. In the First Reading, Elisha offered a similar excuse for delaying following Jesus.

Pope Francis expresses well the wholehearted demand of our relationship with Christ: õBeing Christian us not just obeying orders but means being in Christ, thinking like him, acting like him, acting like him, loving like him; it means letting him take possession of our life and change it, transform it.ö
